For the past three years, I have been working with city staff and neighbors on ways to reduce your water bills. On July 6th, the City Commission voted on a new ordinance to amend the City's Code of Ordinances related to credits for water leaks and unexplained usage in an attempt to simplify the process for utility billing customers and provide meaningful credits to neighbors who experience billing irregularities. The structure and process for requesting credits and the calculation of the

credit amount is complex for staff and can be difficult to explain to impacted neighbors. In an effort to assist our impacted neighbors, staff is proposing changes which include reducing the number of applicable sections in the Code of Ordinances from twelve to seven, providing more consistency between these sections and changing the structure regarding how water leak and unexplained usage credits are processed.

In the proposed ordinance, unexplained usage credits would be available after completion of an application within 60 days of the bill in question. In addition, a meter test and plumber certification that no leak exists is required. This credit


(up to two months) is limited to one time during the life of an account. Leak credits would be available after completion of an application within 60 days of the bill in question. In addition, a plumber certification of leak repair is required. Monthly usage must exceed two times the average for the past year to be eligible for the credit. The current ordinance provides credit based on the neighbor's average rate tier in the system. The proposed ordinance will provide the credit at the lowest tiered rate, allowing for more meaningful credits. In an effort to substantially reduce the frequency of unexplained water usage and water leaks, the City is implementing the use of AMI digital meter software. AMI has the potential to eliminate manual meter reads, provide neighbors


with leak detection alerts, and improve overall accuracy of the system among other benefits. Beginning in July, the City will deploy over 100 new water meters throughout Fort Lauderdale in order to evaluate products from six providers as part of a \$55,000 pilot project. Based on the results of the pilot program, staff will develop specifications for a citywide installation of AMI. Once the procurement process is complete, deployment of 64,000 meters to all of the City's customers is estimated to take 24 months at a cost of \$30 million. The City will seek opportunities available for alternative funding sources such as grants or federal subsidies to help offset the cost of citywide implementation.
